

The last job the council has asked its contractors to complete, is drag the path with a chain harrow, which should pull up the brambles, which could become a trip hazard.

CEO meeting at Wincham

organised by Marbury Cllrs with the CEO of CWaC Delyth Curtis, Jayne Black Head of Highways and Aleta Steele Localities, attended by your MP Esther McVey and all Marbury parish councils to discuss issues of concern.



Marston Councillors asked the following Questions and received these answers.

Q. Why when there are several marked potholes in a stretch of road do 3 trucks and 6 men turn up and only repair one pothole?

A. Repairs to defects are prioritised according to risk. Colas, the council's Highways contractor, will only repair the jobs it has orders for, those orders will have been raised for defects which meet our Safety Inspection Policy criteria. There is a finite budget, therefore there is a real risk that if spent repairing defects which did not meet the intervention criteria, the budget could be spent before the end of the financial year, and the service be left overspending dealing with emergencies only and not meeting its own Safety Inspection Policy. A find and fix solution (where the defect meets the intervention criteria when the contractor attends site) is still being discussed but does need careful consideration. Colas are paid a fixed price per pothole repair, therefore how they manage their resource is for them to decide.

Q. Marston desperately needs a bus service to Northwich. Can you help?

A. The council is happy to explore the possibility of Warrington Borough Transport diverting the CAT9 service operated between Warrington to Northwich. However, it may not be possible to divert given the complex nature of the route and additional time it could take to serve the village.

Q. HGVs regularly use Ollershaw Lane as a cut through to Northwich, they are too big for the small bridge, dangerous and noisy for residents. How can we stop them or re-route them?

A. As there are a lot of businesses in the Wincham area, HGV's will require access and will always travel the direct route. Ollershaw Lane is a classified B Road and plays a key part in connectivity across our road network and provides access for residents and businesses undertaking their operations. It is difficult to prevent HGV's from using Ollershaw Lane as a through route into Northwich as there are currently no access restrictions in place for weight or width reasons. Any environmental restrictions are difficult to enforce as it must be proven that HGV's have not gained legitimate access for deliveries.

Q. Higher Marston Park is not a pleasant place for children to play or for adults to sit and enjoy. How can we ensure proper care and maintenance for our park?

A. The park receives grounds maintenance on a 5-week cycle as per the standard specification, however the



Streetcare and public realm teams would welcome the opportunity to walk the site with the Parish Council to review any proposals they may have in terms of additional infrastructure and maintenance needs. Streetcare Officers have advised of ongoing fly tipping, which is cleared when reported. Regulatory services may play a key role in to try and target individuals who continue to fly-tip in the area if this continues. The play equipment was identified in the Councils Play strategy as being in decent condition, and all equipment will be regularly inspected as part of the Health and Safety policy. The Yourstreets team is available to work with the community to look at who may want to volunteer in the area to improve public open space. Town and Parish Council Conference on Wednesday, 6 March at Chester was attended by Marion and Amanda who were invited to talk about the community activities we do to improve the health and wellbeing of our residents. This is a short version of the talk given by Marion and ably demonstrated by Amanda!



We have a weekly Chair exercise class run by a local fitness instructor, the exercises are designed to be safe for people with mobility or agerelated issues but are challenging enough for all adults of all abilities. The lovely instructor Josh, will tailor the movements and strength required to each person and brings a lot of humour to each class. He also provides exercise bands for the strength and core workouts, these often seem to have a life of their own, pinging off at unguarded moments and catching the back of your head! We have also ordered some extra strong chairs to cope with the additional movements the chairs are now subjected too!

We also run a weekly coffee morning, which brings together a variety of ages, experience and interests. After refreshments and lively discussions there is a weekly quiz to keep minds sharp and we always learn something new.

Marston Murmurs is the Parish Magazine which is produced 10 months of the year and delivered to every home in the village and local facilities such as the pub, Lion Salt works and Gt Budworth Church. This brings contact to people who do not wish or are unable to come to village events or leave their homes and has encouraged community belonging in many

people. We recently were awarded a grant from Freedom Fibre to improve bio diversity and help to bring wildlife into the village, this enabled us to buy a packet of wildflower seeds for every household and these were delivered along with March's magazine. As we



had a discount on the seed packets, buying so many, we have been able to purchase bird boxes, feeders and a bat box. Some of these will go in the Churchyard trees and the bat box on the Village Hall, the rest will be offered to residents in next month's edition.



Remembrance Sunday was a rather sad affair a few years ago with few people attending. With the help of local people, we found out the history of the Marston Lads who went to fight in WW1 and for whom the war memorial was built. It has brought to life the people who lost their lives and the lives of their families and workplaces. It also showed how there

wasn't a family in the Village who didn't lose either a relative, neighbour, friend or work colleague. We also found out the history behind a mysterious photo that hung in the Church Hall. It shows a large Evergreen Arch beneath which a group of people sit. These arches were built at the end of the war to welcome the soldier's home and again on Armistice Day before the permanent war memorials were built. For the centenary of the war memorial, we built a replica of the Evergreen arch in the Churchyard near the war memorial and the War Memorial was rededicated and blessed by our local Vicar. This proved so popular that we have continued to erect the Arch every year and now Remembrance Sunday is attended by over 40 residents and very popular bringing together war veterans, service veterans, young and old people, who respect and wish to honour the fallen. They also seem to enjoy the tea, coffee and biscuits served in the hall afterwards! We support a web site dedicated to the Marston Lads and films of our services have ended up on you tube!

It was nice to remember that we have positive things going on in the village and to be invited to present them to the representatives of the town and parish council representatives

Easter egg cheesecake

If you find yourself with a little left over Easter egg chocolate and/or some of those mini-eggs, a great way of using the leftovers is incorporating them into this delicious cheesecake recipe.



Ingredients

- 175 g reduced-fat digestive biscuits, crushed to a coarse powder
- o 50 g reduced fat butter melted, plus extra for greasing
- o 400 g extra-light cream cheese
- 250 g 0% fat Greek yogurt
- 200 g reduced fat fromage frais
- 100 g caster sugar
- 2 tbsp cornflour
- 2 large free-range eggs, beaten
- o 85 g Easter egg chocolate

Step 1. Preheat the oven to 160°C/fan 140°C, grease a 24cm spring-form tin and line with baking paper

Step 2. Mix the crumbs and butter and press in an even layer over the bottom of the tin. Add 25g of the Easter egg, broken into pieces, across the surface. Chill for 15 minutes.

Step 3. Use an electric hand mixer to beat the cream cheese, yogurt and fromage frais until smooth. Add the caster sugar, and beat for 3 minutes until mixed, then beat in the cornflour and the eggs, a little at a time.

Step 4. Pour into the tin and put on a baking sheet in the middle of the oven and bake for 55-60 minutes. The cake should have a wobble in the centre. Turn the oven off and, leaving the door slightly ajar, let the cake cool completely (about 3 hours).

Step 5. Remove from the tin, and decorate with the remaining Easter eggs whole and grated to serve.
