

The Salt Barge, on Ollershaw Lane in Marston, has been relisted as an asset of community value. This is the first stage of the Community Right to Bid, a legal power designed to protect assets such as pubs, shops and community centres from closing. By being listed as an Asset of Community Value, the community will be given notice if The Salt Barge goes up for sale. They will then have six months to raise the funds to buy it. The Salt Barge was already listed events and a place for local people to meet and interact," read the decision notice. "Due to its location, it also attracts visitors from further afield including canal users, visitors to the Lion Salt Works, walkers/dog walkers using the conservation area of which the pub is a part and residents from the adjacent parishes of Wincham and Great Budworth.

"The pub is also less than 0.5 miles from Ashwood Residential Park, a semi-retirement/retirement development comprising

150 plots, and is used by residents for refreshments and meetings.

"The pub hosts community events at key times of the year as well as charity events and music evenings.

"It offers meeting room facilities that are well used by local heritage groups, organisations and clubs including The Mummers and Morris dancers.

"The pub recently installed five TV screens for sporting events and has its own dominoes, pool and darts teams who compete in local leagues."

It was approved by Maria Byrne, CWAC's director of environment and communities, on December 18. "The pub continues to be recognised by the nominators as an integral valid part of the community. Concluding, Ms Byrne said: "On the evidence provided it is therefore the opinion of the local authority that The Salt Barge, comprising the main building, adjacent beer garden and car park meets the definition of an Asset of Community Value in that the actual current use of the asset is not an ancillary use, it furthers the social wellbeing or social interests of the local community and it is realistic to think that there can continue to be non-ancillary use of the asset which will further the social wellbeing or social interests of the community in the future." As an Asset of Community Value but this had been due to expire and so Marston Parish Council submitted a fresh application to Cheshire West and Chester Council on September 29, 2023.



Neighbourhood Plan

We are grateful to all the residents who have filled out the questionnaire, which will help us form the Neighbourhood Plan. We are going to leave the posting boxes at the garage and the Salt

Barge for another 3 weeks to give everyone a little longer to post their opinions of the village. If you have lost the form, just jot down what you like most and least like about the village, what improvements you would like to see, what amenities you use and your vision for the future of the village. Your opinions are important and we want to include them all.

Green Bin Subscriptions

Residents can subscribe to have their garden waste collected in 2024 from 8 January 2024, with collections due to restart on the week of 26 February 2024.The



service operates on an opt-in basis and will $\cot \pounds 50$ per bin per calendar year for 2024. Residents can subscribe for as many bins as they need, but each will be subject to the £50 charge. Residents in receipt of full council tax reduction will be offered a reduction of £10 on the cost of one garden waste bin.

The best time to sign up for the service is before the end of January to benefit from all 20 collections during the calendar year.

February: Spring is in sight

This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. There plenty to do this month to prepare for the season ahead



as the garden comes to life again, it's time to prune shrubs and climbers, such as Wisteria as well as evergreen hedges.

Jobs this month

Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover. Chit potato tubers

Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting in the green. Prune Conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea

Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses

Prune late-summer flowering clematis, cutting stems back to healthy buds about 30cm from the base.



Divide congested clumps of herbaceous perennials and grasses to make vigorous new plants for free. Keep putting out food and water for

Rhubarb Crumble Muffins

Ingredients

For the muffin mix

175g caster sugar
175g rhubarb, halved lengthways
then diced
2 tbsp sunflower oil
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla extract
125ml buttermilk
200g plain flour
1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

For the crumble topping

50g light muscovado sugar 50g plain flour 25g porridge oats 1 tsp ground cinnamon 50g butter

Method

STEP 1



Heat oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper muffin cases. Stir the sugar and rhubarb together and set aside while you make the crumble topping. Mix together the muscovado sugar with the flour, oats and cinnamon, then rub in the butter until clumpy with your fingertips.

STEP 2

Stir the oil and egg, vanilla and buttermilk into the sugary rhubarb (don't worry if it's a little bit juicy). Now, add the flour, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda and stir well.

STEP 3

Quickly spoon into the cases, then scatter each with a thick layer of the crumble mixture. Bake for 15-18 mins until golden and a cocktail stick poked into the centre of a muffin comes out clean.

Cool on a wire rack.

Rhubarb

The outlandishly coloured vegetable that thinks it a fruit. Rhubarb makes deliciously comforting puddings but its sharpness works extremely well with meat and oily fish dishes. Forced rhubarb (grown in the dark) has yellowish leaves and usually appears in January. The field-grown variety replaces it around April and is less tender but often more flavourful. Rhubarb was used as a medicine in ancient China. It was brought to Europe by Marco Polo and has been eaten as a food since the eighteenth century.
